THE WEDDING CEREMONY

The Chuppah

The wedding ceremony takes place under the chuppah or marriage canopy. The chuppah symbolizes the home that Lori and Shawn will build together. The chuppah is open on all sides to symbolize that family and friends will always be welcome.

The Marriage Ceremony

The marriage ceremony consists of two parts. The first part is Erusin, the betrothal. Erusin begins with a blessing over the wine followed by the betrothal blessings. Erusin concludes with the recitation of vows and the exchanging of the rings. The rings, having no beginning and no end, symbolize wholeness and an unbroken future together.

The second part of the ceremony is Nisuin, the nuptials. It begins with the recitation of the Seven Blessings, over a second cup of wine. These blessings thank God for the fruit of the vine, the creation of the world, the creation of humanity, the perpetuation of life, our survival, the joy of marriage, and the bride and groom's happiness. Lori and Shawn drink from the same cup of wine affirming that throughout life they will experience both joy and sorrow but always together.

The ceremony concludes with Shawn breaking a glass. This tradition reminds us that marriage is fragile and should be handled with care. Just as a broken glass cannot be put back together, we cannot be taken apart. When we hear the sound of the broken glass, family and friends say "mazel tov," congratulations.
